Chromebook access at 100%!

As a result of the pandemic, thousands of young people across the UK have experienced various levels of disruption to their learning, but at King James this has been kept to a minimum thanks to our Chromebook scheme.

Thankfully, we have made it our priority to make sure that all of our students have access to the technology they need to succeed in their learning whatever the future holds; this means that despite the current national lockdown, our children will not be disadvantaged. We are proud to confirm that 100% of our students in Years 7-11 now have access to a Chromebook. Sixth Form students can also purchase a Chromebook at a subsidised price or loan one from the Common Room.

Many subjects now use Chromebooks as standard; teachers deliver lessons in classrooms and from home, and students are able to complete and submit assignments online and receive feedback from their teachers digitally. Students can also email their teachers direct and access a host of resources to help with home study including pre-recorded presentations. This is particularly important for absentees.

Access to digital technology has many advantages; it has opened the door to many new opportunities for learning and our teachers have taken part in a host of after school training sessions to develop their own skills and explore those which would be most beneficial for their subject.

Teachers now incorporate interactive learning tools such as *Quizlet* and *Kahoot*, and use *Google Classroom* to set assignments and share resources. *Class Charts* allows teachers to award points for good work and behaviour, and both students and parents can access this independently to check progress and read comments. *Google Meet* is also used extensively for video lessons. Students have also been registered for free access to *GCSEPod*, an exciting new online resource for learning with a proven track record for improving achievement by one grade for regular users.

Learning with GOOGLE CLASSROOM

Google Classroom is a web service for schools which allows us to create and grade assignments for your child remotely.



Teachers and students can share files quickly and easily so it is therefore the perfect tool to support our new way of learning. We have been using Google Classroom with great success throughout the last term and students are enjoying the benefits it offers.

A whole new way to STUDY & REVISE

All Year 11 students now have free access to the online resource, *GCSEPod*, which allows them to study topics for all subjects in short, high impact bursts of content called 'Pods'.

These audio-visual Pods are specially designed for mobile phones but they can also be watched on a tablet or computer. They can even be downloaded so that they can be watched off line if a student does not have internet access at home. Each Pod, lasting just three to five minutes, uses audio explanations supported by simple visuals to reinforce key concepts. Your child has already been registered for *GCSEPod* and has activated their account at school; this means that they will be able to build their own 'playlist' and access all services. Students in Year 11 have produced an array of quality dishes for the practical element of their Level 2 Hospitality and Catering exam this term.

Provided with an exam brief, students were required to plan and prepare a two-course meal; although the main course was mandatory, students could choose to present either a starter or dessert alongside it.

Dishes included traditional favourites such as dumplings, burgers, chicken and salmon; Italian classics such as ravioli, seafood linguini, spaghetti with meatballs and gnocchi; and an array of delicious curries. Desserts were equally mouth watering with everything from cheesecake and chocolate brownie to meringue, trifle and Italian panna cotta on the menu.

Our young chefs had to think carefully about presentation too as this was also part of the grading criteria and as a result, dishes were displayed in a variety of creative ways befitting of a professional restaurant. Students had clearly considered colour, plate layout and garnishes for maximum appeal. Of course, time management was also part of the challenge as students had to work within strict time constraints, however all succeeded in presenting their dishes on time.

As part of Year 7's Geography unit on Antarctica, students have been designing flags for the UK Polar Network *Antarctica Day Flag Project 2020*.

Over 150 schools from eight different countries took part in this project, with the winning flags from each school being sent to the researchers and scientists in Antarctica. The winning flag from King James was designed by Abi Robson. Her flag, shown here, was photographed at Hope Point, which is near the British Antarctic Survey (BAS) King Edward Point Research Station. King Edward Point is a marine and fisheries research station owned by the Government of South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands, and operated by British Antarctic Survey. This facility provides critical research to support the management of the marine protected area and the sustainable fisheries in this important location in the Southern Ocean.

Mr Murgatroyd's 24 hour marathon raises £1,400 FOR RTS THEATRE

Last term, Mr Murgatroyd raised an amazing £1,400 for the RTS Theatre by successfully completing a 24 hour gaming marathon.

After a full day at work (and a two hour nap!) he set up his Playstation and played through 10 different games over 24 hours in the unique fundraising event, which was streamed live to *Twitch* for the world to see. The original fundraising target was £250 but at the end of the exhausting marathon, thanks to the generosity of a large number of people, RTS now has £1,400 to invest in future productions. Without the funds raised by the annual Christmas Show, which could not go ahead this year, this money will be essential in making sure the return to RTS Theatre an amazing one.

UKMT Senior Maths challenge success!

Pupils at King James I Academy have achieved one silver, two bronze, and four participation awards in this year's UKMT Senior Maths Challenge.

Tens of thousands of pupils from across the UK returned scripts for the Senior Maths Challenge with the top 10% receiving a gold certificate, the next 20% silver, and the next 30% bronze.

Year 12 student, Lucas Stewart achieved a silver award and Best in School, and Courtney Smith in Year 13, and Adam Hughes in Year 12 both achieved a bronze award.

Riley Johnson and Rebecca Howarth, both in Year 13, and Year 12s, Daniel Hardy and Mikey Taylor all received certificates of participation for their efforts. Well done to all of our A-Level Maths students who took part in this year's competition.



Creating future FILM MAKERS

As part of their coursework Sixth Form Media Production students have been creating a series of news programmes and short documentary films on a variety of topics to appeal to young people.

The client brief for the factual production unit offered a great deal of creative freedom in that students were allowed to research and propose a unique topic for their documentary. This open brief resulted in a wide range of fascinating productions from 'This is M.E.' an intimate documentary about this debilitating medical condition and the difficulties faced by those who live with it on a daily basis, to 'The Ugly Truth about Social Media,' which examines the negative effects of social media upon self-esteem. Other topics included the impact of gaming upon young people, fitness addiction and the music industry crisis as a result of lockdown.

The unit has given students the opportunity to build a host of transferable skills; not only have they successfully planned and managed the whole production but they have also written the script, conducted interviews, presented on camera and filmed all of their own footage before editing into a finished product.

COMING SOON in Media...

In 2021, the Media Department aspires to launch its very own video-on-demand service called 'KJ:TV'.

Similar to BBC iPlayer, KJ:TV will give the community access to a wide range of programmes and videos in categories, all produced by media students at the Academy. The news programmes and documentaries will be the first to help populate the site however, the intention is to collaborate with other departments to produce videos for other categories such as a cooking programme from Food Science & Nutrition, performance videos from the Music Department, a book review show with English, and fitness videos with Sport & PE.


Sending letters to France for new PENPAL SCHEME

Students were put into two teams and were given the opportunity to work with a Durham University student to help them put together their presentation. The competition was held online with the groups speaking in Spanish to a panel of judges from the *Auckland Project*, *Durham University* and the *International Office at Durham County Council*.

Students have been working hard on exam pieces in our Drama & Performing Arts Department throughout the last term.


In A'Level Drama and Theatre, Chloe Box and Georgia Andrews spectacularly deconstructed Ken Kasey's novel 'One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest' in what was one of the most powerful pieces the department has ever produced. They were challenged with creating a performance that lasted only six minutes, but in that time they managed to question sanity, gender stereotypes, crime and punishment and look at how reality can be manipulated through words. Miss Howard, Director of Learning for the department said, "This

successful performance was grade A in standard and the work ethic of the group was second to none. It has been an honour to work with such amazing, dedicated students."

In Performing Arts the class have been putting together a dynamic performance based on the film, 'Labyrinth', and have used physical theatre in combination with Drama to create contemporary, dynamic performance pieces. The ideas in the class are outstanding and we are excited to see what the final result will be.



Art and Photography



It's been a busy term for Art and Photography students in all year groups with coursework and exam preparation well underway for both GCSE and A'Level.

Year 10s have been working on two projects, one being a horror project and the other looking at stop motion photography. Students took advantage of the historic look of our old school building to take some horror-themed images and used masks and carved pumpkins with smoke bombs to get some really interesting effects. They also had the opportunity to try levitation photography, shown left, which allowed them to develop their skills in photo-manipulation.



For the stop motions, students had great fun creating Pac-Man from playdough, snakes from Skittles, and a huge real-life Tetris game from Starburst sweets!

Students have also been developing their creative photography skills by experimenting with the shutter speed on their DSLR cameras to create some interesting light trails and light paintings.

They also experimented with inks in water, and photographed it to look like fire.

Year 11 Art students have worked really hard during their Art mock exam and have produced some high-quality work within the challenging time frame. Students experimented with a variety of media and techniques such as painting, drawing, textiles, 3D Sculptures and epoxy resin art. Photography students in Year 11 have produced creative results using ferrofluid with magnets (magnetic liquid) and made some unique and beautiful patterns such as the one pictured top left.

Our A'Level Photography students are busy developing their skills in studio-style photo shoots by experimenting with backdrops, artificial lighting and specialist equipment to create specific effects. They have also built upon their industry skills by using Photoshop to perfect their images.



FEEDING FAMILIES at Christmas

As part of our annual Christmas fundraising programme, students and staff at King James collected food donations to support the North East based charity, *Feeding Families*. The charity provides food hampers to families in need across the region.

Launched in Christmas 2016, the aim of *Feeding Families* is to support those who are struggling to make ends meet. Sadly, due to the pandemic, more families than ever are faced difficult times this year, including many in and around Bishop Auckland, and the gift of a festive hamper helped to make a real difference.

Students at King James are encouraged to propose and organise fundraising activities and events throughout the academic year, and they are free to suggest which charity should benefit from their efforts. The fundraising initiative for *Feeding Families* was organised by Year 13 student, Jess Baronowski, pictured above with charity representative, Tony Byrne, who came to collect the donation.

Jess contacted the organisation to request donation boxes and followed up with an Academy-wide promotion of the scheme. To boost donations, Jess also raised an additional £51 thanks to a 'Name the Bear' competition, with all funds raised used to buy festive treats such as mince pies, biscuits, sweets and chocolates. The sound of The Last Post echoing around our school buildings was palpable, and many of our students and teachers commented that the video made them feel more involved in the Remembrance Service.
